#### Flawed stem cell data withdrawn

It is one of the best-known stem cell papers in the past five years, describing adult cells that seemed to hold the same promise as embryonic stem cells. Now, following inquiries by **New Scientist**, some of the data contained within the papers is being questioned.

In 2002, a team led by Catherine Verfaillie of the University of Minnesota. Minneapolis, described "multipotent adult progenitor cells" or MAPCs, isolated from the bone marrow of rodents (Nature, vol 418, p 41). These cells seemed able to develop into most of the body's tissues.

Previously, only embryonic stem cells (ESCs) had proved so versatile, and the work was seized upon by opponents of ESC research, who claimed it showed similarly versatile cells could be harvested without destroying human embryos.

#### A Pianist's Recordings Draw Praise, but Were They All Hers?

PARIS, Feb. 16 — In the autumn of her life, decades after she had last performed in public, the British pianist Joyce Hatto was rediscovered by a small group of musicians and critics who contended that her recordings of Chopin, Rachmaninoff, Liszt and others ranked alongside those of the 20th century's most exceptional virtuosos.

When she died last June at 77, some of those same enthusiasts again proclaimed her to be a neglected genius, in glowing obituaries written for British newspapers. In The Guardian, the music critic Jeremy Nicholas described her as "one of the greatest pianists Britain has ever produced."

Mr. Nicholas and others, it seems, had accepted the explanation for her lack of renown among music lovers: a long battle against cancer had forced her to abandon her concert career in 1976 and led her to devote her energy to recording all the great works in the piano repertory, from Scarlatti to Messiaen, for the small British label Concert Artist.

"Joyce Hatto must be the greatest living pianist that almost no one has ever heard of," Richard Dyer wrote in The Boston Globe in 2005.

But now Ms. Hatto's reputation for excellence and originality has been shaken by a charge of plagiarism. Gramophone, the London music monthly, has presented evidence that several of the recordings issued under her name were in fact copied from recordings of the same music by other planists.


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#### More backlash for Google Print

Attacks on Google's Print for Libraries service keep on coming from the nonprofit publishing sector. Now the Association for Learned and Professional Society Publishers, which represents non-profit publishers such as university presses in more than 30 countries, is taking aim at the legality of Google's service. By publishing complete digital copies of various works without consulting with the publishers, Google is clearly violating copyright law, the ALPSP alleges in a July statement.

Google wasn't always in the wrong, the ALPSP notes. The two parties collaborated on "full-text indexing" of online publications in Google's Print for Publishers feature, and the ALPSP encouraged its publishers to participate in the venture. But Google had no right to
